Spot Light on Service Fundraising

The Muskegon Northside Lions continues to be active in fund raising. There is just so much you can do with "hands on" projects. Other projects take monetary efforts. We have four major fundraisers – Raffle calendar (becoming the raffle ticket), Candy Days, Pancake Breakfasts and White Cane Tag Days.

In this article I am spotlighting the Candy Days.

In recent years Lion Jim Irwin (our first vice president) has been chairing Candy Days. In this effort, Lions are at the intersection of Witham Drive and Dykstra Road as well as at Harding's Friendly Market. There, our members offer Lions' Wintergreen mints as well as Fizzy Fruit candies in exchange for a donation.

To prepare for this event, Lion Jim inventories our supplies (mints and candy), secures the aprons from Lion Ron Hansen's "warehouse" and reminds me that I need to secure permission from Laketon Township and Harding's Friendly Market as well as secure the needed liability insurance from Lions Clubs International Legal division.

This year additional mints and candies were needed from the Lions of Michigan Foundation. An order was placed, and I picked the supplies up in Mt. Pleasant saving the club a couple hundred dollars in shipping costs. Highway cones were borrowed from the North Muskegon Department of Public Works as a safety measure. Then Lion Jim began recruiting members to work the two locations on Friday September 3rd and Saturday September 4th. In addition Lions were recruited to help count the proceeds. This year 27 Lions working a total of 73 hours collected a net profit of \$2,450.66. Not a record but certainly enough to help support our causes.

Next month I hope to spot light our new and improved raffle project. That leaves White Cane Tag Days to be covered. Hopefully after our fundraisers are spotlighted, I can provide information on some of community service projects such as Kids' Christmas shopping, the scholarship programs, teacher grants, food trucks, bicycle/walking paths clean up, work on the Veterans' Memorial Causeway Park and any other project that comes to mind.

Each event is more complicated than one might think and takes a lot of coordination. We are so fortunate to have chairpersons talented and willing to get the jobs done.
